Carbone's research on early coastal operations in North Carolina was later incorporated into his book, *The Civil War in Coastal North Carolina* (Raleigh, NC: Division of Archives and History, North Carolina Dept. of Cultural Resources, 2001). He is also the author of *A Lawyer's Guide to Understanding Psychiatry*.
